

"Judge not, lest ye be judged." Pastor Steve / June 3, 2018 Matthew 7:1-6

- 1. What Jesus didn't mean when he said, "judge not"
  - To abandon our critical faculties
  - To avoid all **confrontation** of sin or evil
  - To be squishy about God's word
- 2. What Jesus did mean when he said, "judge not"
  - To resist being hypercritical
  - To avoid **condemning** others
  - To refuse to <u>take delight</u> in another person's failures
- 3. Signs that we have moved from discernment into condemnation:
  - Casting judgment, even when it is no concern of ours
  - Putting prejudice or personality ahead of principle
  - Casting judgment even when I don't know the facts
  - Casting judgment without taking the circumstances into account
  - Pronouncing final judgment upon a person as such
- 4. Why must we resist judging?
  - Lest we be judged by <u>others</u>
  - Lest we be judged by God (divine passive)
- 5. A parable about judgment—the beam and the speck.
  - We have a tendency to see faults in <u>others</u> before we see them in ourselves.

- We often try to correct someone else without changing our own behavior.
- We must allow <u>God</u> to remove the offending beam.
- 6. What about the dogs?
  - Jesus clearly does not intend that we avoid preaching to unbelievers.
  - Jesus could be using instructive <u>irony</u>. If so, his meaning is the <u>opposite</u> of the literal words.
  - A call for discernment—we must not try to force our message upon those who show no inclination to accept it.
  - We respect the <u>message</u> so deeply that we are willing to lose the respect of <u>detractors</u>.

## **Applications:**

- Allow the Holy Spirit to search your heart. How have you made judgments about a person or persons in the last few days? Did you stay on the side of discernment? Did you fall into a condemning attitude?
- When you hear about the failure of someone you don't like, what is your response? What part of you takes delight in their sin?
- What behavior would you like to see changed in someone close to you? What behavior of your own does God want to change first?
