

Who is Jesus? Matthew 16:13-20 Pastor Steve March 4, 2018

Key thought: We can't figure out Jesus on our own; he must **be revealed to us.** But when we see who he is, it **changes us.**

The Jews were hoping for the <u>promised rescuer</u> who would turn the tables on their oppressors.

- 1. He would be a **leader** like **Moses.** (Deuteronomy 18:15)
 - A <u>divinely prepared</u> deliverer
 - One who speaks the words of God
 - One who does the works of God
- 2. He would be the **anointed one** from David's family. (Isaiah 16:5)
 - He is in David's <u>dynasty</u> and <u>legacy</u>
 - The **Spirit of the LORD** is on him (Isaiah 61:1)
- 3. Over time, this hope was relegated to the future age.

Peter identifies Jesus as the one who fulfills that promise.

- 1. Peter didn't figure it <u>out on his own</u>—Jesus' Father <u>revealed</u> it to him.
- 2. The revelation resulted in
 - A new **identity**
 - A new **assignment**
 - A new authority (power)

3. The new assignment was immediately **tested** (Matthew 16:21-23)

What did Peter do to receive revelation?

- 1. In most respects, **nothing**; the Father simply **delighted** to reveal his Son to him. (Luke 12:32)
- 2. He accepted Jesus' invitations. (Matthew 4:19-10; 14:29)
- 3. He was in community.

Applications:

- 1. Put your trust in the Father's delight. How will you do that?
- 2. Open up to Jesus' invitations. How will you do that?
- 3. Immerse yourself in Christ's community. How will you do that?
